Endocrine Therapy for Postmenopausal Women Postmenopausal women with hormone receptor positive breast cancer may be offered adjuvant therapy with either tamoxifen or with an aromatase inhibitor. Aromatase inhibitors belong to a class of drugs that work by reducing the levels of estrogen in the body.

Endocrine therapy fights cancer by reducing or blocking the production or effects of hormones. It may be given after surgery, chemotherapy and radiation. Endocrine therapy reduces the risk of breast cancer coming back and reduces the risk of a new breast cancer. Research shows that these drugs also help prevent breast cancer.

### Hormone Therapy for Breast Cancer Fact Sheet - National ...

The breast cancer cells have receptors (proteins) that attach to estrogen and progesterone, which helps them grow. Treatments that stop these hormones from attaching to these receptors are called hormone or endocrine therapy. Hormone therapy can reach cancer cells almost anywhere in the body and not just in the breast.

Implications for Practice: Many breast cancer survivors on endocrine therapy (ET) experience a range of side effects while taking ET. Targeting potentially modifiable factors associated with attributing a greater number of symptoms to ET, including perceived need for ET, concerns about long-term ET use, negative emotions toward ET, and symptoms of anxiety and depression, may reduce symptom ...

Hormonal (anti-estrogen) therapy works against hormone-receptor-positive breast cancer. It is completely different from hormone replacement therapy (HRT), which some women take during or following menopause. HRT is not a breast cancer treatment, and for women with a breast cancer diagnosis, HRT is considered relatively unsafe.

The hormones oestrogen and progesterone, particularly oestrogen, can encourage some breast cancers to grow. Hormonal therapies reduce the amount of oestrogen in the body or stop it attaching to the cancer cells. They only work for women with oestrogen-receptor (ER) positive cancers.

Tamoxifen is one of the most commonly used hormone therapies for breast cancer. Women who are still having periods (are premenopausal) and women who have had their menopause (post menopausal) can take tamoxifen. You might also have this treatment if you are a man with breast cancer. Tamoxifen works by blocking the oestrogen receptors.

Tailoring Adjuvant Endocrine Therapy for Premenopausal Breast Cancer Among premenopausal women with breast cancer, the addition of ovarian suppression to tamoxifen resulted in significantly higher 8-year rates of both disease-free and overall survival than tamoxifen alone.

### **Types of Hormone Therapy Drugs for Breast Cancer Treatment**

Endocrine surgery is a surgical procedure that is performed to achieve a hormonal or anti-hormonal effect in the body. Surgical procedures to remove hormone -producing tissues are among the first attempts at endocrine therapy of cancer (e.g., oophorectomy or adrenalectomy for breast cancer, orchiectomy for prostate cancer).
