In people with other forms of intellectual disability (ID), average dementia onset is approximately 10 years prior to that experienced by the general population. A practical approach would be to screen for evidence of decline at around the age of 40, by asking questions about decline and using a carer-report checklist.

Individuals with intellectual disability (ID) are now living longer with the majority of individuals reaching middle and even "old age." As a consequence of this extended longevity they are vulnerable to the same age-associated health problems as elderly adults in the general population without ID.
